

## Internet Safety Scenarios

1. While in a Chat room at home, you meet a really cool friend. They ask to meet you at the mall. They ask you to describe what you look like so they can recognize you when you get there. Do you go? Do you give information?
2. You receive an E-mail that really makes you angry. You want to give the sender a “piece of your mind.” How do you respond?
3. You are doing research for a class project in the lab. You use a search engine to find links for the project. You click on one of the links and it opens to a webpage that you realize has little if anything to do with your research topic & it shows a picture of a scantily dressed or nude person. What should you do?
4. You open your E-mail and get SPAM mail. You open it and it is a picture of a naked person with a link to become a member to a pornography site. Do you delete it, reply and ask to be eliminated from mailing list, or tell your parents?
5. You and your friend really hate a classmate because they are “talking stuff” and stole your boyfriend/girlfriend. Since you have their home e-mail address you decide to send them an e-mail. In your message, you call them a well-deserved name and warn them that if they don’t back off they had better “watch their back”. What can happen to you?
6. You are playing games on the Internet and the website asks you to register as a user or for a contest using your name, address, phone number and/or e-mail.
7. You are using the Internet in a teen chat room. The “teen” at the other end of the chat asks for your measurements. How do you respond?
8. You are using a clipart website that asks for personal information and a credit card number to register to use the 30-day free trial graphics. Do you get your parents credit card and enter the info?
9. You open a webpage and a scrolling banner across the top declares you a winner. You click on it because it promises a vacation to an exotic island paradise. It asks you for your complete e-mail and password to send you information about your prize.
10. You receive a “chain letter” via e-mail. It promises that if you send it on to twenty of your friends you will receive a large sum of money. It also tells of misfortune that has befallen non-believers who did not forward the e-mail.
